Lyndale Avenue North – Northern Gateway to Minneapolis Studied by Uof M students

yndale Ave North, has been an identified major transportation corridor on Minneapolis's atlas maps since the turn of the 19th Century. The banks of the Mississippi have been packed with brickmill and lumbermill jobs. C.A. Smith Lumbermill, the world's largest lumbermill, spawned another entrepreneurial business on the corridor called Mereen-Johnson that still is in operation today. Everyone traveling to this job hub, or to the City's Workhouse, or Hopewell Hospital, whether to stay or visit, took the streetcar line north on Lyndale Ave. N. to get there.

In 2003, the Lind Bohanon Neighborhood Association (LBNA) along with the help of the then City's Minneapolis Community Development Agency, Landform, using Neighborhood Revitalization Program dollars, conducted a community study to look at this very mixed use commercial corridor and capture what residents, business owners, and the public had in mind for revitalizing the City's "smallest commercial corridor" from the City limits at 53rd Ave. N. to the railroad tracks at 43rd Ave. N. The "North Lyndale Avenue — Your Road Map to Redevelopment" — study yielded tremendous results on Lyndale, such as attracting the Father's and Their Children Together development and building to the corridor, a matching grant business improvement program, and many others. Association, utilized Leighton's University of Minnesota Urban Studies class and spent the last quarter investigating and updating information from the original work. His class of over 20 urban studies students interviewed local business owners, local leaders, residents and others, and collected and updated data regarding the Lyndale Ave. N. commercial corridor. They presented their findings at a neighborhood meeting in May.

A plethora of story boards, dioramas, and powerpoint presentations were displayed at an open house

This spring, Tom Leighton, a City of Minneapolis Planner, in partnership with the Lind Bohanon Neighborhood presentation last month that outlined

everything from the history of the corridor, art and park potential improvements, social and demographic information about the area, walking and bike path potential updates, and "easy wins" or simple things that could be implemented quite easily to help dress up the corridor.

LBNA Board Chair David Barnett and neighborhood residents were quite impressed with the presentation. "We are very grateful to Mr. Leighton, his students, and the University of Minnesota for saving us a great deal of time and effort and increasing our capacity," stated Barnett. "The students have done a lot of the heavy lifting identifying potential redevelopment properties, strategic partners and

tential redevelopment properties, strategic partners and "easy wins." We're looking forward to getting started taking this refreshed information and working with local residents, businesses, and various partners to continue to improve the neighborhood and the Lyndale Ave North corridor. "

It is sad to lose hundreds of century-old trees as well. Yet we will stand together and rebuild the Northside better than ever!






Get your yoga out there

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
Neighborhood Housing Services celebrates 31 years

Peonies – a perennial favorite

Peonies became very popular in the home landscape in Minnesota in the early 1920s. In fact the 21st annual National Peony Show was held in St. Paul in 1924. My horticultural memory recalls huge blooms of white, pink, magenta, rose and maroon in late May and early June, in every yard on our Northside blocks in the 1950s. Hundreds of varieties and cultivars of perennials have been introduced into the Minnesota floriculture since then, but peonies remain a sentimental favorite for me and many other gardeners.

Peonies produce beautiful displays of spring flowers and have attractive foliage that remains dark green until the first frost in the fall. They are relatively easy to grow if they are planted in the right spot where all their needs can be met. They need full sun, which means a minimum of 4-5 hours of sunlight a day. More is better and the plant will produce more and bigger blooms the more direct sunlight it receives. Dwarf peonies should be planted 2 feet

New bike-walk center coming to Northside


In mid May the Minneapolis City Council approved a proposal by Redeemer Center for Life to operate a new bike walk center in North Minneapolis that will improve access to, and affordability of, physical activity opportunities for Northside residents while encouraging them to bike and walk more for transportation and recreation. Redeemer Center for Life is a non-profit, faithbased, community development organization.

The new bike walk center, at 1830 Glenwood, will sell bicycles, bicycle-related products, pedestrian goods (reusable shopping bags, compact grocery carts, umbrellas, transit passes and other accessories) and provide bike repair and maintenance services. The bike walk center will also include programming and resources to encourage residents to bike and walk for transportation and recreation. No specific date is set for the opening; Mayor Rybeck says, "soon."

apart and standards 4 feet apart to allow for good air circulation, and they need adequate water but good soil drainage. Peonies can be divided in the early spring or the late summer. To divide, dig up the entire clump and use a knife to cut the clump in half or in fourths. The smaller the division the longer it will be before the plant blooms again. Peonies do not like to be transplanted and some times it can be 2 or 3 years before they flower again.

Failure to bloom is a very common complaint about peonies. There are a number of possible reasons they fail to flower. Too little sunlight can be one cause. Peonies are long-lived plants and over the course of 20+ years their once sunny location may become too shady. If that is the case you may have to move your plant to a new, sunnier location. If they fail to bloom after being moved it could be because they have been planted too deep. When planting them the "eyes" (the pink buds in the plant's crown) should be fac-


help."



ing up and no more than 1 to 1-1/2" beneath the soil. If they are planted deeper they may fail to bloom for a few years, but don't give up! Fortunately the crown will lift itself a little bit every year until the eyes are at just the right depth for the plant to bloom.

Peonies are hardy and vigorous growers under the proper conditions, but they can be victims of disease. Two of these are Botrytis and Phytophthora Blights. Both are fungi that commonly appear in cloudy and rainy weather. Botrytis attacks in the early spring when the young shoots are only 6" high and eventually spreads to the stems, leaves and buds. The buds will be covered with gray fuzzy spores after rain. Symptoms of Phytophtora Blight are similar to Botrytis except there will be no fuzzy growth. Instead the infected buds will become dark brown and leathery. Good air circulation around the plants will help to prevent the introduction of either fungus and good sanitation will prevent the spread of them.

Planted in the right spot and with the proper care you can enjoy peonies for many years.

Speech and English teacher, Con**nie Blom**, was inducted into the PHHS Hall of Fame this year following a very successful career. Blom was a teacher from '66-98 and coach from '71-98. Her teams earned honors on the regional and state level, along with numerous individual medal winners. Blom also served as the International Baccalaureate coordinator from ·90-98.

After retiring from PHHS, she shared her expertise as an education instructor at St. Mary's University, and Minneapolis Community and Technical College. She continues to use her educator skills tutoring and teaching elementary and adult students and religion classes.

Our second inductee was a student during Blom's tenure. Paul **Donahue** graduated with the class of '72. He was an avid participant in theater, one act plays and the choir. He also found time to serve the school through student government and was a member of the swim team.

2007 Patrick Henry Graduate's Story. Stefani Zappa, class of 2007, participated in volleyball, Nordic skiing and golf. She captained both the volleyball and golf teams and earned all-conference honors four times in golf and three times in volleyball. She was also captain of the math team. She topped off her senior year by being named the PHHS Athena Award winner (the highest athletic honor given to young women).

Zappa attended Augsburg College as an Elementary Education major and joined their prestigious woman's golf team. As a senior, she became the first Augsburg women's golfer to earn multiple All-Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors. During her final collegiate event, Zappa recorded the highest-ever finish for an Auggie at the MIAC championships, finishing 7th with a 250 (86-83-81) total, tying her school record for best score in a 54-hole event. Zappa's 7th-place finish is the fourth All-MIAC finish (top 10) for an Auggie women's golfer in school history. Zappa is one of three women's golfers in Augsburg history to record 25th-or-better finishes in three MIAC meets.

Scholarship dollars roll in for Admission Possible class of 2011

Mai See Khang came home recently after an Admission Possible session to find her 10-year-old sister hiding a package from her. "She thinks it's fun to deliver news," she said. "I freaked out because I saw "Gates" printed on the package. I opened it, read "Congratulations," and did what I think everyone else did. I stopped reading, ran around screaming, and I cried," she said. That's exactly what her classmates Ia Vang and Kue Xiong also did when they came home from an Admission Possible session to find large packages with letters that began, "Congratulations" from the Gates Millennium scholarship fund.

The Gates Millennium scholarship is supported by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and gives students a full ride to college, even covering the cost of a doctorate degree in some fields of study. For Patrick Henry students Khang, Vang and Xiong, winning the Gates Scholarship means their dreams of attending college will come true. Each student is from a low-income Hmong family, and each knew that paying for college was a financial burden they would have to carry themselves. Their Admission Possible coach, Laura, helped them tackle the lengthy scholarship application by encouraging them to write from the heart and offering feedback on their essays.

"For the past two years Admission Possible has been my guidance throughout the college process," Xiong said. "It's great to know that I don't have to go through it all by myself because I know I have Laura there to help me so it's less overwhelming." Each Admission Possible participant receives intensive ACT preparation, support completing college and financial aid applications and has the opportunity to attend campus visits during their two years in the program.

Scholarships aside, each young woman's accomplishments are impressive. All three take a full International Baccalaureate course load and balance Admission Possible session with other extracurricular activities. Vang, who came to the U.S. in 1994 from Thailand, describes herself as "multi-interested," participating in after-school activities ranging from Asia Club to the Camden Youth Engagement Project. Vang will attend Carleton College in the fall and hopes to narrow her interests in medicine, teaching and advocacy. Xiong will attend Connecticut College to study Japanese language and culture, and Khang will attend the University of Minnesota to cultivate her passion for math and science.

Last year's Admission Possible seniors won more than \$2 million in scholarships and other merit-based aid. Helping students seek financial aid is a core component of Admission Possible's mission. AmeriCorps coaches help seniors complete the complex Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and identify private and institutional scholarship applications.

Admission Possible is a Minnesota nonprofit organization founded in 2000 and helps make college admission and success possible for low-income students through an intensive curriculum of coaching and support. For program info visit www.AdmissionPossible.org.

Hmong students successfully lobby at the capitol

In April North Minneapolis Hmong students enrolled in Hopkins and Wayzata schools went to the Minnesota State Capitol to talk with elected officials in an attempt to preserve the transportation money that enables them to attend their schools.

The group of 25 Hmong students went in two waves, but they faced long odds: When they got to the capitol the senate education committee had already voted to cut the bus transportation money starting in 2012.

But the students made their case to more than two dozen legislators - and more than one official said they appreciated being able to talk with real people, not paid lobbyists.

On May 13, the efforts of the Hmong students paid off: In conference committee, house and

senate Republicans agreed to maintain the funding for the bus transportation.

Currently, there are about 60 Northside Hmong students at Hopkins and about 20 at Wayzata. It was the outreach of the Hmong students that preserved the money. Had they not gone to the capitol, the bus transportation money almost certainly would have been cut along with the other programs. In the process, the immigrant students also got a great education in civics and leadership.



Fresh, locally grown food available on West Broadway

The West Broadway Farmers Market is opening Sunday June 5! The market will be located at 2101 West Broadway near the intersection of Penn and W. Broadway; open Sundays June 5 to October 30, 8 a.m.-1 p.m., and Wednesdays July 6 to October 26, 3-7 p.m. The farmers market is a project of the West Broadway Business and Area Coalition (WBC). The purpose of the market is to increase healthy food access, stimulate local economic development, and provide a fun and friendly community gathering space for Northside residents and visitors. The market will accept EBT beginning in July.

The market is dedicated to providing local products; vendors will be responsible for growing and/or creating the goods that they sell at the market, which provides customers with the opportunity to get to know who is growing their food and how it is grown. West Broadway Farmers Market Manager Alida Uzark says, "From a business association perspective, the WBC realizes the importance of providing entrepreneurs with a low-risk starting place to grow their business, revitalize the commercial corridor, and keep the dollars recycling locally. From the farmers market perspective, local means we are offering the freshest food possible throughout the growing season." The produce available will change weekly due to the growing season of different fruits and vegetables.

Vendors will sell a variety of local goods throughout the season including: Produce — beans, greens, beets, broccoli, collards, carrots, cauliflower, corn, cucumbers, herbs, lettuce, onions, peas, peppers radishes, tomatoes, green onions, oriental vegetables, potatoes, cabbage, summer squash, zucchini, squash, kohlrabi, carrot, leeks, watermelon, sweet corn, spinach, berries, apples, pumpkins and more; all natural farm-raised prime beef, lamb, pork, chicken and turkey; bakery items including pastries and homemade bread; ready to eat foods like green salads, BBQ beef, chicken, pork, coleslaw, potato salad and dessert items; and Kindred Kitchen vendors with granola, popcorn, drink mixes; and flowers, art and jewelry.

Free woodchips available

April showers (or snow) may bring May flowers, but June brings free woodchips for gardeners in Minneapolis from the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board.

The MPRB offers free woodchips to Minneapolis residents on a firstcome, first-served basis at various park sites. The supplies vary based on the amount of trees being removed and the location of the work being done. Keep in mind that woodchips are popular and are often quickly taken. The forestry department does not monitor quantities after delivery to sites, and are unable to tell residents where woodchips are available.

In Camden woodchips are available at the Northside Service Center parking lot, on the north side of 45th Ave. N between Victory Memorial Drive and the railroad tracks; and at Folwell Park parking lot, Dowling and Knox.

Save the date: Victory Memorial Drive Rededication on June 11

Hennepin County and its project partners invite the public to attend the Victory Memorial Drive Rededication on June 11. The historic landscaped boulevard, which commemorates the 568 men and women of Hennepin County who died in World War I, is celebrating its 90th Anniversary and recently underwent a restoration and renovation. The June 11 rededication program is being held in conjunction with Minnesotans' Military Appreciation Fund's Say Thanks Day 5K Run/2 mile Walk. There will be a military flyover, numerous exhibits of war artifacts and machinery, historical reenactments, a children's' scavenger hunt, and more. Activities will be centered at the flagpole plaza, located at the intersection of Victory Memorial Drive and 45th Avenue North. Northsiders to get surveyed about bicycling and walking

Some 300 North Minneapolis residents will be surveyed over the next four to six weeks to determine their current behaviors, attitudes and perceptions about bicycling and walking in the community.

Findings of the survey, sponsored by Bike Walk Twin Cities (BWTC) and the Minneapolis Department of Health and Family Support (MDHFS), will be used to understand how Northside residents use bicycling and walking as a means of transportation, as well as how bicycling and walking can promote community health and wellness. A follow-up survey, to be conducted this fall, will measure changes in awareness of bicycling and walking options and their actual use as ways to get around.

The surveys, which take approximately 15 minutes, will be conducted by trained community volunteers recruited by the Minneapolis-based Cultural Wellness Center. Many of the survey interviewers are members of the Major Taylor Bicycle Club and/or are North Minneapolis residents. Interviewers will be readily identifiable by wearing brightly colored "Bike. Walk. Move" t-shirts.

Survey respondents will be chosen from randomly selected households in the Willard-Hay, Near North, Cleveland, Folwell, McKinley, Hawthorne and Jordan neighborhoods. Interviewers will visit sampled residences in these neighborhoods on weekdays in the early evening and on Saturdays. Survey participation is voluntary. The surveys will be conducted face-to-face, but respondents will have the option of completing the survey online or by phone at a later time.

"The input of North Minneapolis residents is vital to understanding how bicycling and walking fit into everyday life," said Joan Pasiuk, program director of BWTC, a program of Transit for Livable Communities. "Survey respondents will have a direct say in helping forge a stronger Northside community."

The survey was created by Minneapolis-based Rainbow Research, Inc., a non-profit research and evaluation firm with a long history of local neighborhood-based and participatory evaluation. Several projects funded by BWTC and MDHFS to improve bicycling and walking access in North Minneapolis have been completed or are underway this summer.

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Behind the Victory Flagpole – Happy anniversary to the Drive

Would you believe it has been 90 years since the Victory Memorial Drive was first dedicated! Most of us weren't even around then. Did you know what was there before the "Drive" was constructed? Prairies and fields and forests and Indians, of course. The tribes living in the area were from the Mdewakanton band of Dakota (Sioux) nation and their range was between the central and southern half of Minnesota. They loved living around the water and called Shingle Creek "Omnina Wakan Wakpadan" or Spirit Refuge Creek.

In the middle of the 19th Century many Europeans moved into the area to farm, and when Minneapolis was officially authorized by the Minnesota Territorial Legislature in 1856, the Indians left and were replaced by "squatters" who made their claims to the land. A charter was issued by the state legislature in 1867 upgrading Minneapolis to a city, but the land where the Drive and flagpole were to be built was not annexed until 1887.

The Minneapolis Park Board began the acquisition of the lands over which the Drive would be built in 1910 and continued for a year. The original plan was for straight roads and walks with green lawns in between. Construction got off to a good start in 1911, but unforeseen was WWI. Just like today, when something big happens, everything closes down. There were bigger problems to be solved with a war going on. So in 1917, as money was dwindling, construction halted.

The one good thing that happened during this rest period was that it gave people time to think. This is when the idea of having the new roadway, originally to be called Glenwood-Camden Parkway, got changed to Victory Memorial Drive. The two men most responsible for the theme and the landscaping of the area, which was to be a commemorative to the fallen soldiers and nurses of WWI, were Theodore Wirth and Charles Loring. Theodore Wirth, in the 1918 annual report, discussed having long parallel rows of trees along the drive with a monument in front of each tree with the name of the soldier it represented. Charles Loring, first president of the Minneapolis Park Board, had already been spearheading the plan to plant trees all around the country, and had written a book about it in 1919 which mentioned that Minneapolis had already begun work on the Memorial Drive. He stated the project would cost over \$100,000, with \$50,000 having already been given by a citizen, in trust for the maintenance. He failed to mention that the "citizen" was Loring himself, who had also paid for the elm trees which eventually were planted.


The parkway was dedicated in 1921. Its beginning was at 19th Ave. N. and Lowry at the south end and ran along the western

boundary of Minneapolis. The parkway then took a right-angle turn at 45th and Xerxes and continued for three miles east, connecting Webber Parkway and Charles C. Webber Park. It was just about four miles long. At the turning point a wooden flagpole was erected, which was there at the dedication. Later, that flagpole was replaced with a bronze one, in time for Decoration Day, 1923.

The American Legion of Hennepin County had

the pole set in an ornamental brick base containing eight bronze plaques. These plaques contained messages from General John J. Pershing and Marshal F. Foch. Other sides of the octagon contained the names of soldiers who fought in WWI and the Preamble of the Constitution.

In 1924, 10 memorial trees were planted around the flagpole representing the Hennepin County posts of the Grand Army of the Republic, which were supported by the American Legion. They were known as the "Grand Army Circle." In 1928, the American Legion and Hennepin County installed



a dedication tablet for Victory Memorial Drive to mark the 10th anniversary of the signing of the armistice that ended WWI. At the same time, the wooden crosses that were in front of each tree were replaced by bronze stars or crosses. These monuments stated the name, rank and company of each soldier they represented.

In 1996, on the 75th anniversary of the Victory Memorial Drive, the Drive was rededicated to all Hennepin County military people who lost their lives serving their country.



Julie Kastigar Boada – Art is a powerful tool for people to tell stories that are on the fringe

Bright smiles and a radiant glow of optimism emanate from the lovely Native-American performance artist, storyteller and puppeteer Julie Kastigar Boada. Julie categorizes her work into three segments: performances, building puppets and teaching.

The performance portion of her career encompasses a wide variety of aspects. In addition to performing puppet shows and storytelling she has four touring productions: The first is *Nanabosho, the Anishinabe Coyote "Trickster"* stories with storytelling and puppetry; next is *Skeleton in the Closet*, a presentation of the Day of the Dead or Día de los Muertos (a Mexicano/Aztec holiday remembering and honoring the ancestors); the third is *Shingebis*, the red breasted Merganser Diver Duck tales; and fourth is *On the Day You Were Born*, a story by Debra Frasier originally presented by In the Heart of the Beast Puppet and Mask Theater (HOBT).

Julie has lived on the Northside for 20 years, residing in her current location for the last 15 years. She has raised two sons, Troy and Tom, and two grandchildren, Christopher and Michael. She resides with her father, Edward, and her husband, Gustavo Boada. Gustavo is a Peruvian artist, puppeteer and mask maker.

Born in Duluth, Julie was brought to Crystal, Minnesota at age four where she lived with her two sisters and parents. Julie recalls as a young girl going to the Walker Art Center with her dad and getting very excited about the collage artwork. Julie elaborated, "I was always drawing and painting and making dolls. I never imagined I would be a puppeteer! My sisters and I would put on shows about fairy tales and make up musicals. My dad would bring home empty refrigerator boxes and we would make sets for our shows." This process is similar to the HOBT practice of puppet making and float construction for such events as the 37th Annual Mayday Celebration recently held on May 1.

Julie received a BA degree from the University of Minnesota in Studio Art and American Indian Studies. She worked with sculpture, performance art and installations, usually outdoors. Julie mixed traditionally-inspired ideas with her own blending of interpretations of earth religions. This is truly a very powerful, passionate and creative process interweaving history with a contemporary disposition.

Julie's introduction into puppetry came at a time while doing her graduate work in college. She was hired by another Northsider and puppeteer, Dan Polnau. He created a show called *Anaconda* and Julie worked as a puppeteer and mask builder; she portrayed a monkey, an alligator and a fish. This production in turn launched her into working with HOBT performing Discover America and Circles of 500. Originally on staff with HOBT Julie now works as a contract artist; a good portion of her work is with HOBT.

Julie recently received a Minnesota State Arts Board grant for her creation Hidden History; set in the 1600s-1800s, it is a performance piece about the Great Lakes region during the fur trade, prior to the settlers occupation. She recently received a travel study grant to study in Copper Canyon in Chihuahua, Mexico with the indigenous people Raramuri (what they call themselves) or the Tarahumara (the scientific term). That was a four-week excursion. This summer Julie will be doing a "Gather Stories and Community Pageant" in Fergus Falls, Minnesota, funded through the Fergus Falls Center for the Arts. Julie expresses that "Art is a powerful tool for people to tell stories that are on the fringe. It gives voice to people who don't ordinarily have a voice for expression." Keep your home safe this summer

As the much anticipated warmer weather is here and we all begin the process of airing out our homes and working in our yards the Minneapolis Police Department reminds all residents to harden their home against springtime crimes of opportunity. Each year the MPD sees a rise in burglaries and thefts because of open windows and doors, as well as thefts from yards and garages.

Some common sense tips to help prevent becoming a victim include: Pinning windows so that they open only far enough to allow air in but not far enough to allow a burglar to use them to gain entry to your home. Six inches is recommended. When working in the backyard remember to secure the front door. Some burglars are brave and fast enough to enter your home and make off with valuables before you know they have even been there. Don't leave garage doors open even for a few minutes. The visible items stored there make a very tempting target to someone passing by. Don't leave valuable items such as bicycles and lawn equipment in your yard, especially overnight. Beware of the influx of door to door salesman and home repair contractors. Do your homework before hiring anyone to do work on your home and get a written estimate before work begins. And remember that all door-to-door salesmen must be licensed by the City. Report suspicious activity in your neighborhood to 911 immediately. Waiting will most likely take away the opportunity for officers to contact the person you are calling about. A number of home burglars have been caught as a result of neighbors immediately calling 911. Never allow someone you don't know into your home. Common ruses used to gain entry are requests to use a phone or to get a drink of water.

Speaking of people going door to door, be especially wary of people ringing your door bell and asking for money. There is at least one known scam artist working some of the Northside neighborhoods. He usually has a hard luck story about his car being broken down or in the impound lot, and he needs some cash to get it.

Hard luck stories like this are almost always fraudulent. Scam artists prey on the generous nature of their victims.

Scam artists engaging in this activity are often described by their victims as "well spoken" and "clean cut." Don't be fooled by a "respectable" appearance, or a friendly, respectful demeanor. It's all part of the con.

Giving money to people begging door to door can get you tagged as an "easy mark." This often leads to a cycle of repeat visits and increased demands for money and assistance.

Burglars will also ring door bells looking for unoccupied homes. If someone answers the door they will often come up with some kind of hard luck story in an attempt to extract money from the person answering the door.

Call 911 to report suspicious activity. This includes strangers walking down your alley and looking in garages, loitering, or vehicles circling the block with occupants you don't recognize.





MPRB seeking public input

The Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) has developed a draft new policy and ordinance amendment related to how it involves the community in park projects, and is seeking public review and comment through mid June on the proposed changes. The policy and amended ordinance on community involvement are designed to improve practices for how the MPRB works and communicates with Minneapolis residents and park users.

"This effort to improve our community involvement process aligns with priorities of the Board of Commissioners and the goals outlined in the Comprehensive Plan," explained Superintendent Jayne Miller. "It is vital that we effectively and proactively involve residents in identifying the program, service, and facility needs of their respective communities. The 45 day review and comment period will ensure a more fully vetted policy and ordinance that will enhance our ability to work with the public."

From May 2 through June 15, the draft policy and amended ordinance are available for review at www.minneapolisparks.org, recreation centers and Park Board headquarters. Comments can be submitted online during that same period or via email to feedback@minneapolisparks.org, or by attending a scheduled public information meeting, June 2, 9-10 a.m., MPRB Headquarters, 2117 West River Rd, 612-230-6400.

In 2010, various community outreach methods were used to gather opinion from the community in development of the proposed policy and amended ordinance. Individuals and community groups were invited to share their thoughts through an online survey, public meetings, focus group discussions, and print questionnaires available at recreation centers. Staff interviewed residents at community events such as neighborhood socials, movies, and concerts in the parks.

In mid-June, at the conclusion of the 45-day review period, public responses will be incorporated into a revised policy and amended ordinance and presented to the Board for review and approval.
