No new Webber Library ... yet

n May 22, at the Hennepin County Commissioners meeting, Mark Stenglein moved Resolution No. 12-0263. Commissioner Mike Opat seconded the resolution and it passed unanimously. Moving, discussing and voting on the resolution took three minutes and nine seconds. The resolution removed the new Webber Park Library from the Capital Budget, it established a \$500,000 Webber Park Library Improvements Capital Project which would be funded by Minneapolis Library bonds, and directed the Library and Property Services staff to design improvements to the existing Webber Park Library.

It is difficult to write about this newest development in the life of our 102-year-old library. The last decade has been tumultuous. At the beginning of this century Webber Park Library patrons enjoyed full service hours at Webber Park Library. Unfortunately, as the State of Minnesota cut Local Government Aid to Minneapolis, our libraries suffered financially and Webber Park Library was limited to four days of service. By 2006 the Minneapolis Public Library system was in jeopardy. In an effort to keep libraries across Minneapolis open, the Minneapolis and Hennepin Library systems were consolidated, and three libraries were shuttered for the 2007 year of negotiations. Webber Park Library was one of them. If January 2007 was the nadir moment for Webber Park Library, January 2008 seemed to be its zenith. In December 2007, Hennepin County Commissioners approved the consolidation, voted to reopen the

shuttered libraries and also approved a \$15 million capital budget for a new Webber Park Library. Commissioners Mike Opat and Mark Stenglein unveiled the preliminary plans at the grand reopening in January 2008 and I believe they thought it would happen. It was easy to be optimistic.

Speculation about the demise of this project is difficult and likely not helpful. Resolution No. 12-0263 points to the inability to acquire one parcel of land, but it could also be argued that the "T's should have been crossed and the I's dotted" before large sums of money were spent on property acquisition and architectural designs.

At the May 22 meeting, County Commissioner Jeff Johnson asked what happens to the money allocated for the project and also about the three properties that had been purchased for the new library using bond proceeds earmarked for library projects. County Administrator Richard Johnson said, "The budget for unspent dollars would be removed and could be reallocated," and regarding the property, "It is County property. We'd have to consider whether to put it on the market or consider whether it has any further use for the county, otherwise we declare it surplus."

If the County sells the land, federal tax regulations would require that properties purchased with bond proceeds would be put back into capital projects. Additionally, it should be noted that when the merger took place a budget of \$2,095,000 was identified to remodel the Webber Park Library with funding provided from the City of Minneapolis bond proceeds per the 2000 Minneapolis Library referendum. If one dares to be optimistic, you could imagine that a future library project might include a new Webber Park Library.

With the retirement of Mark Stenglein, voters will have the opportunity to ask the candidates their views on the future of Webber Park Library.

It is also important to note that Hennepin County has made improvements to many of the public libraries. Roosevelt, one of the three shuttered libraries, is currently undergoing a \$3.2 million renovation. Nokomis Library reopened in April of 2011, after a \$6.9 million renovation. Southeast Library, the third shuttered library, is in line for a \$12 million renovation or rebuild, and many of the libraries have received ergonomic and other improvements. Additionally, 14 libraries have received expanded hours made possible by revenues from the Twins' stadium tax.

uity for Webber Park Library it is a challenge to stay sanguine. For my part I try to focus on those who are working to improve our library, regardless of setbacks. A person who comes to mind is Mary Martinson, president and one of the founders of the Friends of Webber Park Library. She works tirelessly to improve the opportunities for programs at Webber Park Library — right now, right where it is — even while she too waits for better days ahead.

I remember Edna C. Downing, a North Minneapolis teacher who trumpeted literacy and left a \$10,000 bequest to Webber Park Library in her estate to continue her work in that regard. I think of Charles and Mary Webber, who had the foresight to leave a legacy that has lasted for 102 years.

B efore the July *Camden News* went to print Jennifer Ringold, Manager of Public Engagement and Citywide Planning notified the paper with the following:

"We are happy to report that the state legislature has approved legislation to allow the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board (MPRB) to pilot the natural water treatment system that was recommended as a result of the community advisory process and approved by MPRB commissioners. The need to take legislative action was identified after the community meetings were complete. We are working through design details and anticipate that construction documents will be complete this fall. We will be able to report on a revised construction schedule shortly. Penn Avenue Community Works Project

The Hennepin County Board approved the Penn Avenue Community Works Project, which will be located along Penn Avenue between Highway 55 and 44th Ave. N. The project aims to further stimulate economic recovery, beautification, livability and job creation in North Minneapolis.

This stretch of Penn Avenue is the home of major housing and neighborhood activity centers providing commercial services and employment opportunities to surrounding neighborhoods. The project is strategically located to serve as a focal point for redevelopment in North Minneapolis and assist recovery from the destructive forces of the 2011 tornado, the foreclosure crisis and the current economic recession.

A plan for the project will be developed throughout the next four months, including project goals, participating organizations, an organizational structure, work plan and budget.

Get registered for the August 14 Primary

Beginning in 2012, voters will use the new voting precincts that were set by the 2012 Redistricting Plan. All pre-registered voters will receive a postcard in early July telling them their new voting precinct and polling place.

Are you pre-registered? If you are not registered with your current name or address, you can register at government offices, libraries, park buildings, fire and police stations. Registration cards in Hmong, Russian, Somali, Spanish, and Vietnamese are available on the elections website.

All individuals whose registration applications are received by elections officials by 5 p.m. on July 24 will be pre-registered for the August 14 Primary. Voters who newly register will receive a postcard notifying them where to vote. Pre-registration for the General Election re-opens the day after the Primary.

If you miss the deadline to pre-register, you may still be able to vote. Minnesota is one of several states with Election Day registration. Individuals may register at the polls on Election Day by providing one of the forms of identification required by Minnesota law. Please allow extra time at the polls to register. See the website for identification allowed for Election Day registration.

Absentee voting is easy. Minneapolis voters unable to vote in person at the polls on Election Day may vote in person at Minneapolis City Hall or by mail. Absentee ballot applications are available online and may be sent anytime throughout the year. Absentee voting for the Primary opens Friday, June 29 at the Minneapolis Office of Elections, 350 Fifth St. S. – Room 1B (ground floor of City Hall).

On-line tools help voters participate in the election. The Voter Registration Lookup at https://mnvotes.sos.state.mn.us/VoterStatus.aspx allows voters to enter their name, birthday, and address,

and this tool will quickly tell voters whether they are registered at that address. To find out where to vote, use the Minnesota Polling Place Finder at http://pollfinder.sos.state.mn.us.

The City of Minneapolis is seeking bilingual election judges. Minneapolis seeks language support specifically in American Sign Lan-

guage, and Spanish, Somali, Hmong, Vietnamese, Oromo, Laotian and Russian languages. If you are eligible to vote and are fluent in English and a second language, contact the Minneapolis Office of Elections at 612-673-3870 or apply to be an election judge at www.minneapolismn.gov/elections. Selection and placement of judges is based on qualifications of applicants and party balance within the precinct. Preference will be given to those willing to serve a full day in a precinct with a vacancy.

Who represents you in the City of Minneapolis? Current city elected officials continue to represent the Ward or District from which they were elected through 2013. Here's what voters need to know: City Council Members elected in 2009 continue to represent the Wards from which they were elected through 2013; Park District Commissioners elected in 2009 continue to represent the Districts from which they were elected through 2013; and City-wide officials elected to city-wide office continue to serve the entire city

Dog park etiquette

One of the great aspects of summer for your dog is to run free and play. Most dogs love the dog park. They get to socialize, fetch, swim and just be a dog. A well socialized dog tends to exhibit less unwanted behaviors such as barking, property destruction and aggression. As a pet owner, one can also make friendships with other pet owners that share similar interests. After several months of

terests. After several months of Minnesota cabin fever, our furry friends need release, too. Fortunately, we have a great dog-friendly community with an ever-growing number of dog parks both in the urban and suburban areas. As pet owners, there are some unwritten rules

we should adhere to when bringing our pooches to play.

First of all, never leave your dog unattended. Dog parks are not a drop-off option. Second, while you are there, clean up after your dog! Many dog parks have a baggie dispenser or a scooper but do not count on it. Bring your own baggie or tool to pick up the poo.

You should have your pup current on vaccines and have a valid license. Some parks require a city license, some a special dog park license in addition. If you frequent multiple dog parks, make sure you know their specific rules. I recommend waiting until your pet is at least 4 months of age, has had all the puppy shots and ideally spayed or neutered before

going to the park. If you are not going to spay your female, do not bring her to the park when in heat. Aside from unwanted pregnancy, it can cause some unnecessary aggression in some dogs.

We all have our bad days, dogs included. If your dog is not playing well with others, end the play date, leash your dog and come back another day. You may also

> notice some dogs get along better with certain dogs. As a matter of fact, it has been proven that dogs remember each other by sight and smell. You may find that Spot and Rufus play very well together but when Charlie is in the mix, some unwanted behaviors may arise. That being said,

consider limiting your charges to less than three dogs. It is too hard to watch one dog let alone two or more

Finally, when you enter and leave the dog park, keep your dog on a leash and close the gate. Do not bring young children unless they can be supervised closely. Smoking and eating should be done outside the park. Cigarette butts are not good for dogs and food can become a distractor as well as littering concerns.

Beware the Japanese beetle

They're **back!** Those nasty unwelcome visitors that invaded us last year have returned – Japanese beetles. These are not actually the same insects that were munching our plants last year but this is the next generation which has overwintered in soil beneath our lawns as young grubs. The adult beetles usually emerge from the turf the first week of July – but another effect of our early spring is that they started to emerge in mid-June this year.

Japanese beetles are a major pest introduced into the U.S. in 1916. They were first identified in Minnesota in 1968, and they have been increasing in numbers the last four to five years. They are pests because the adults feed on the leaves and flowers of over 300 species of plants and the grubs feed on the roots of turf grass. How this year's numbers will compare to last year's is hard to say. Grubs have a harder

time surviving in dry soil than in moist so the drought of late summer and fall last year may have helped to reduce their numbers. On the other hand the mild temperatures of this past winter would have been beneficial to the Japanese beetle grubs but the lack of snow cover would have contributed to drier soil.

Japanese beetles live about 85 percent of their lives as grubs in the soil beneath the turf grass. From the time they hatch until they reach full size in September they feed on the turf roots. As temperatures drop they burrow down two to 10 inches to overwinter, rising to continue feeding as temperatures rise in the spring. By early July they emerge as adult beetles for the express purpose of feeding, and propagating. The adults only live for about 60 days.

In Japan they are not a serious a threat because there are natural predators to control the population and in the eastern U.S. they are controlled by protozoans that live in the soil; protozoans that do not exist in Minnesota. As with most non-native pests, Japanese beetles can grow to epidemic proportions because of the lack of natural predators, so it is up to us to try to control them; either in the grub stage or the adults before they can propagate.

Control of the adult beetle can be managed a number of ways. Simply brushing them off the plants is not effective as they will simply move into another plant or garden. Also beetle damaged foliage as well as the beetles themselves emit a pheromone that attracts more beetles. For this reason, and to ensure that the females cannot lay their eggs, they need to be destroyed. The most environmentally friendly way to do that is to shake or knock them off of the plants into a bucket or jar of soapy water. The soapy water will kill them. If it is not practical to handpick them, low impact products such as Neem or pyrethrins containing PBOs could be used. Other systemic insecticides can be used but these can be toxic to bees, beneficial pollinators as well as the beetles. Beetle traps are another option but tests reveal that they actually attract more beetles than they kill.

Large numbers of adult beetles in your garden does not necessarily mean that you had a large number of grubs in your turf grass. The Japanese beetle is very mobile and those you see on your roses may have emerged from a lawn some distance away. However those adult beetles in your garden could very

well lay their eggs in your lawn this year. So if you wish to prevent the next generation of Japanese beetles from developing in your lawn the best time to treat the lawn with a preventive insecticide, such as imidachloprid, is in early July or as soon as you see the adult beetles flying around. Within two or three weeks the adults will have laid their eggs and the grubs will have begun to hatch. Treating the grass early allows the insecticide to be taken up by the grass plant by the time the grubs hatch. The young grubs are most susceptible to preventive insecticides, but older grubs are not so much. You can apply curative insecticides such as trichlorfon, until mid-August to eradicate older grubs.

I hope you are spared the invasive of the beetle this year but if not join me in the war to eradicate them!



The Northside's new link to the Southside

City and community leaders are celebrating the start of a landmark project that will bridge a big divide between the Northside and Southside of Minneapolis. For decades, Interstates 394 and 94 and rail lines have contributed to physical and cultural barriers between these two sections of the city. Work has now begun to extend Van White Memorial Boulevard south of Glenwood Avenue to Dunwoody under I-394. When the work is completed next year, the street will provide both communities of Minneapolis a vital connection to each other, the rest of the city and the metro area.

The mile of roadway being built will connect the Harrison and Bryn Mawr neighborhoods to Interstate 394 and neighborhoods south of the freeway. It includes a 600-foot bridge that will span the Burlington Northern Santa Fe rail lines and the Cedar Lake Trail. A smaller bridge will cross Bassett Creek.

The resulting boulevard will provide an important link between North and South Minneapolis. The barrier created by the freeway and tracks have contributed to the isolation of the Northside. Crossing this barrier should help strengthen the Northside's connections to jobs and recreational, cultural and educational resources throughout the city. It will also help spur development in one of the most undeveloped areas near downtown Minneapolis.

The first section of Van White Memorial Boulevard was completed in 2002. It serves as the main street for Heritage Park, which is now home to 620 families. When the extension of Van White Memorial Boulevard is completed at the end of 2013, the street will stretch from Interstate 394 and Dunwoody Boulevard in the south to Plymouth Ave. N.

The boulevard is named in honor of the City's first African-American councilmember. Van White represented the 5th Ward from 1980 to 1990, and also worked for the City's Public Works Department from 1956 to 1968. He passed away in 1993 at the age of 68.

Trying the rails

On June 16, 25 North Minneapolis Laotians rode the Hiawatha Light Rail Train to Mall of America. Their purpose: the Bottineau LRT has been proposed for North Minneapolis, and they wanted to decide first-hand whether or not LRT would be good for North Minneapolis.

Their unanimous vote: They want Light Rail Transit for North Minneapolis.

Before heading off to Mall of America, the trip-takers were asked about their usage of city buses. Most said that had ridden a city bus at some time in their lives. However, none had ridden the bus in the past week, and less than half had ridden the bus this year. Most had never ridden the Hiawatha LRT.

They said they used the bus for going to the hospital, doctor's appointments, job interviews and graduations. They liked using the bus because it saved them money and parking, and they didn't have to start their car in the winter. They didn't use the bus more often because they were afraid to get lost, didn't know the route, were confused on times and transfers, and sometimes the bus didn't go where they needed.

They boarded a city bus in North Minneapolis, then transferred to the LRT downtown. They stopped at the Cedar Ave. station on the way to the mall, to



get a good look at a station in an immigrant-heavy residential area. After inspecting the Cedar Ave. stop they said they liked the train because it was faster than the bus, was smooth, fun, clean and safe. Ideas they had for improving the train included: Less noise, more heaters, more roofing, more benches, bathrooms at every stop, more walls and fencing, wider yellow safety strips with words saying caution, and a strobe light when trains are coming. They also wanted to see signage in Lao and other languages. Some said they did would not feel safe alone.

Everybody enthusiastically raised their hands when asked if they wanted Light Rail Transit in North Minneapolis.

They stayed at the Mall of America for a couple of hours, then headed back home, stopping first at Minnehaha Falls to join festivities for World Refugee Day.

As they exited the train and trudged through downtown looking for the bus stop, they said they looked forward to the day the train could take them straight home.

Fireworks facts

Certain types of fireworks became legal in Minnesota in April 2002. With warmer weather and an increase of complaints about fireworks, the Minneapolis Police Department wants you to know these facts:

What's legal? Minnesota law permits the sale, possession and use of some non-explosive and non-aerial fireworks. Examples include sparklers, cones and tubes that emit sparks, and novelty items like snakes and party poppers. (These consumer fireworks may not be used on public property such as roads, alleys, schools and parks.)

Purchasers of these fireworks must be at least 18 years old. Sale, possession and use may occur at any time during the year.

Fireworks can only be sold from inside a permanent structure. Merchants selling fireworks from any location other than a permanent structure are in a violation of a city ordinance.

What's illegal? The law still prohibits explosive and aerial fireworks for public sale, possession and use. Examples of illegal fireworks include firecrackers, bottle rockets, missiles, roman candles, mortars and shells—any fireworks that are explosive or aerial.

Please comply with the fireworks law! Be a considerate neighbor! Shooting off fireworks can be extremely frustrating for neighbors, especially when homes are close to each other, people are trying to sleep and pets are frightened. Fireworks can also be very dangerous

Bright Water students celebrate a million minutes of reading

The students of Bright Water Montessori preschool and Bright Water Elementary public charter school were challenged at the beginning of the 2011-12 school year to collectively read a million minutes outside the school day. This meant that each of the 180 students would have to either read or be read to for 20 to 30 minutes a day at home or out of school. Each week the students would bring their reading logs back to school and the amounts for each classroom would be totaled and recorded. Students were shown the Montessori cube of a million compared to the tiny cube of one, then challenged to determine how many minutes each child would have to read to make a million minutes. This project became both a math and literacy charge for the community. Classrooms challenged each other to read more. The community joined



in the push and more parents and friends became reading mentors for students. Older students mentored and listened to younger students read. At the end of the school year, the students recorded 1,117,642 minutes of reading for the year. Wow!

The Bright Water community celebrated on June 6 with the Billion Books Bash. There was dinner, storytelling by North Minneapolis luminaries and book-making activities. Children dressed as their favorite character and told others about their favorite story during this celebration of the love of books and reading.

Henry High Hmong students ask Minneapolis School Board to keep school buses

On June 12, Henry High Hmong students went to the Minneapolis School Board (MPS) Meeting and asked that the Go-To mass transit bus card be optional for the 2012-2013 school year at Henry, and keep school bus rides available.

In late April, the MPS announced that the Henry High school buses would be eliminated in the fall, and eligible students needing transportation would have to take city buses, using the Go-To card.

Gary Vang, who just completed 10th grade at Henry High, testified at the meeting. He said that he likes going to Henry High, he feels close to many of the staff, and his friends to go Henry. He especially likes his world history class, and he has joined the math team and the debate team.

But Gary said that his family is concerned about his safety using city buses, and his mother has chosen to transfer him, and his seven brothers and sisters



Many Henry Hmong families have expressed both worry for the safety of their children on city buses, and anger that the school system never asked for feedback or ideas from the Henry Hmong families.

Hmong students and families have proposed instituting the city bus Go-To card as an option this fall at Henry, with school bus rides available.

The MPS would then have the time to communicate with and listen to the Hmong families, and if some Henry students use the city buses with no problems, then it could help reassure the Hmong families that riding the city buses can be safe.

who currently attend Minneapolis public schools, to a charter school that offers school bus rides.


He hopes that this fall Henry High institutes the Go-To card as an option, with school buses available, so he can stay and graduate from Henry High.

Since MPS announced the termination of school buses at Henry, Hmong students and families have collected more than 1100 postcards; met with school board members Monserrate and Ellison; sent letters to all the school board members; testified to the Minneapolis school board; and gone on Hmong radio to promote their cause.







"As we started to plan this festive concert to celebrate our five-year milestone, we felt it was important to feature a few of the many artists who have helped transform the Capri into what Minnesota Monthly has hailed as 'the Twin Cities' Best Jazz Venue."



Storm spotting

How did we know there would be a tornado cutting its jagged swath across our neighborhood last year on Sunday, May 22, 2011? Of course, nobody knew soon enough ahead to avoid the massive destruction they themselves suffered, and thank goodness no more lives were lost. These are such vicious storms. There were terrible, and mostly unannounced, tornadoes through the Northside of Minneapolis in the mid-1960s, and

I was told at a storm spotting class I attended early this June, that the May 2011 tornado was first reported on the ground by a local Skywarn spotter, just minutes before it hit. That is how fast severe weather can strike!

The Metro Skywarn consists of over a thousand amateur radio operators in the Twin Cities area who are trained storm spotters. To participate in Skywarn, we must hold an amateur radio license, own our own equipment, and take the storm spotter training at least once every two years. Having met these preparation requirements, our reports of very specific storm events are sent immediately by our network control radio station to the National Weather Service, for evaluating the local storm's intensity, direction, etc. Very specific events are reported such as, tornado on the ground, funnel cloud, wall cloud, 3-inch or larger tree limbs down, hail, flooding, and whatever else the net control operator asks for.

First of all, I must caution you that Skywarn does not train storm chasers. Storm chasing, though their reports are helpful, even enlightening, requires much more intensive training and must be done completely at the chaser's own risk. Skywarn storm spotting, however, is carried on with the utmost in safety to the spotters. For an extreme example, where was this trained storm spotter (namely, I myself) on May 22, 2011? Answer: 220 miles north of here, the safest place to be during that storm!

By now, I hope you are asking, "But how can I (namely, you) become a trained storm spotter, if I don't have an amateur radio license?" There are ways to do that, as well as to get the necessary training and make official reports to the National Weather Service. Readers of the Camden News may have answers, how to get involved in storm spotting. Please share your information in a letter to our editor, Laurel Parrott; email editor@camdenews.org, or write to the Camden Community News, PO Box 11492, Minneapolis, MN 55411.

I believe there are more links to storm spotting on the web; let me give you a couple pages to take a look at. Skywarn deserves a good look, at www.metroskywarn.org. Emergency "9-1-1" should not, in general, be used for storm reporting—except only for damage which poses an immediate threat to life or property, such as fires, gas leaks, medical emergencies, blocked roads, downed wires, or significant flooding. The state and city police have other emergencies to tend to, other than storm monitoring.

The National Weather Service has two sites that are very interesting: http://espotter.weather.gov/, for online weather reporting. Again, for the eSpotter Service, you must take training. And on top of that, any training we can get will help us as individuals to better understand how and what the weather in our environment does. Take a look also at www.crh.noaa. gov/mpx/ for Minneapolis area weather predictions and information.

Finally, for you who are more technically inclined and interested in combining storm spotting with the exact Global Positioning System (GPS) location for each and every spotter reporting on a local storm system, check out http://www.spotternetwork.org.

Behind the Victory Flagpole – Lovina's story

Hello-my name is Mrs. Silas Farnham. You can call me Lovina. I am married to Steven Silas Farnham. the sixth child of Rufus Farnham, Sr. The Farnhams were some of the first pioneers coming from Maine to St. Anthony in 1849. We women just follow along with our husbands, wherever they go. Our main job is to raise children, do the gardening and all the

My husband, Silas, was a woodsman, or you could call him a lumberman. He kept a little storehouse for supplies across from our house on the corner of 3rd Ave. and 2nd St., S.E. A schoolhouse was much needed so they cleared out the shed and made a school out of it. Miss Electa Backus taught the first school there. It was also used for Methodist preachin' and our First Aid Society met there, too.

I well remember the first Fourth of July Celebration in St. Anthony in 1849. The women found there was no flag, so knew one must be made. They procured the materials from Fort Snelling and the flag was made in Mrs. Godfrey's house. Ladies working on it were Mrs. Caleb Dorr, Mrs. Lucien Parker, Misses Julia and Margaret Farnham, Mrs. Godfrey (whose husband built the sawmill in '47) and myself. I cut out all the stars.

Mrs. Wm. Marshall, whose husband had a small general store, was the director and no one could do it better. Thinking of that little store, I thought I'd laugh out loud the first time I went in there. It was so different from the stores back in Maine! There were packs of furs, all kinds of Indian work, hats and caps, homemade tallow dips plus elegant candles, a barrel of rounds of pork mostly used up, some hulled corn the Indians did, and no flour-all of that was goneand you know flour was quite expensive—it was \$15 to \$20 a barrel. I noticed, too, that there was a beautiful piece of delaine—that is a piece of light woolen dress material to sell to the village women and some shoddy looking bright stuff for the squaws. I thought that was kind of unfair, until I found out the squaws preferred the bright stuff.

But to return to that first Fourth. It seemed a good deal like a Farnham Fourth, for the music which was just soul searching was sung by them and the Gould boys. When the Farnhams all came out, it made a pretty big crowd for those days. Perhaps their voices wasn't what you call trained, but they had melody. Seems to me nowadays some of the trained high-falutin' voices has just got that left out. At least it seems so to me. All the Farnhams sung natural, just like birds. Old Dr. Kingsley played the bass viol so it was soul stirrin' too. I will say we had a fine time!

Well, that's a small picture of how life is in this new community of ours. The Farnhams, and there are a lot of us pioneers, seem to be very adventuresome people, for all the travelling we do. Lovina Farnham
